MISCELLANEOUS TIPS AND IDEAS

John 21:17 Jesus said, "Feed my sheep."

Try to have your pastor give a short opening devotion before Sunday school so the children can learn to know him and be comfortable around him.

During our opening devotion we celebrate birthdays of the week. At the end or beginning of the Sunday school season we celebrate the summer birthdays. When it is the students or teachers birthday, they bring in a coin for every year of their age. We count when they put it in the bank and then we sing a birthday song: We wish a Happy Birthday to your our little friend, and may the heavenly Father his kindest blessings send. At the end of the year we decide where to donate the savings.

It is fun to have the children learn songs and then sing them during a church service.

Have the kids learn a hymn that you regularly sing on Sundays. During the service have your pastor remind the kids that they know the upcoming song. It helps to get the children to actively participate in the service.

Have a spinning wheel at your opening devotion. A student spins the wheel and that gives the point value for the days review questions. The superintendent keeps score and prizes are given at the end of the year.

Send students Birthday, Christmas, Valentine, and Easter cards.

Have the teens adopt a grandparent. They can visit them, send them cards, rake etc.

Have an Easter and Christmas ½ day Bible school with stories, music and crafts. Invite your community.

Become pen pals with Sunday school students from another congregation.

Have a bulletin board with photos of all Sunday school students.

Have the students watch the questioning for the confirmation students.

Have your pastor visit every class once. It is good for teachers and good for pastor to see that we are doing a good job.

Distribute a newsletter 3 times a year. Have an article by each teacher about what you've learned, thank parents for bringing their children and the kids for singing.

Be organized, have a Sunday school schedule for the year. Know the lessons to be taught, schedule teacher's meetings, when you are singing in church and any special Sunday school themes.

Before the first day of Sunday school, send your students a welcome letter.

Try to talk with a parent when the child is picked up or dropped off.

Encourage attendance. Ask about any absences. When absent try to send a letter with the days lesson and worksheets.

Have a Sunday school committee. Include a few teachers, a parent and a sub.

Try to share teaching with another teacher.

Have a substitute teacher list.

Get help in the classroom by asking adults or teens in the congregation.

Explain how Sunday school offerings are used.

Example of where to use your Sunday school offerings:

Send to missionaries overseas, provide for our church services(candles, bulletins),

Sunday school materials, improve our property etc.

Have a competition with offerings. Have rain gauges drawn on poster board. The dollar amounts get added and marked by the 7th and 8th graders. The kids keep a close watch and bring in their own money, not just what they are given from mom & dad. The competition is self induced and was something unexpected.

Emphasize the church calendar. Many students don't know about the church seasons.

Have a teen bible class during the Sunday school hour. Have teens responsible for filling up bags of candy to give out on Christmas to the small children.

Send your students baptism and confirmation cards.

Have a fall party in October. Bring in treats.

Have a bring your parents day. This could be a Sunday school kickoff day. It is a good time to explain your expectations to parents and students. Introduce teachers, show classrooms and explain class and memory work.

Have a bring a friend to Sunday school day.

Have children dress up as bible characters and do a skit.

Each spring you could have a knowledge bowl Sunday. You take 8-10 of the years stories and make up 10 questions for each. Some years you could use a baseball type of

the baseball format have popcorn during the game and hot dogs after. The children study for weeks. All questions are given in advance. The idea is to learn, not to stump everyone.

Guidelines for a Sunday school superintendent:

Runs Sunday school business meeting
Visit classes and help the teachers
Keep track of enrollment
Maintain and order all supplies
Arrange for singing(practices, accompaniments)
Coordinate rooms and enrollments.
Look at the teacher training materials and bring them to the teachers
Provide substitute teaching
Organize student registration on Sundays the first few weeks of the school year
Report Sunday school activities to the congregation
Prepare the years schedule for Sunday school classes and activities
Prepare a quarterly Sunday school newsletter


SCRIPTURE CAKE

Serves 16+ Oven temp. 300° - 2 Hours

Amount	Bible Verse	Actual Ingredient
½ cup.	Judges 5:25 (last item)	
2 cups	Jeremiah 6:20	
2 Tbsp.	I Samuel 14:25	
6	Jeremiah 17:11, separated	
1-1/2 cups	I Kings 4:22	
2 tsp.	Amos 4:5	
To taste	II Chronicles 9:9	,
A pinch	Leviticus 2:13	
½ cup	Judges 4:19 (last item)	
2 cups	Numbers 17:8	
2 cups	Nahum 3:12	
2 cups	I Samuel 30:12	

DIRECTIONS FOR BAKING:

- Cream Judges (first) with Jeremiah. Add 2 Tbsp. I Samuel (first).
- Beat the 6 Jeremiah yolks. Add to creamed mixture.
- Combine I Kings, Amos, II Chronicles, pinch of Leviticus.
 Add alternately with ½ cup Judges (second) to the above creamed mixture.
- Add Nahum, Numbers and I Samuel (second).
- Beat the 6 Jeremiah whites until stiff. Fold into the above.
- Bake two hours in a GREASED tube pan at 300°. Note: If you use dates, watch carefully at end of baking time. They are quite sugary and may tend to burn at edges.
- Serve warm or cold with a dollop of whipped cream. Yummy!!

A typical class will be:

10:00 - 10:12	Practice Share Jesus' , finish memory work if needed
10:12 - 10:15	Pray together using A.C.T.S.
10:15	Dismissal

This activity was done to help our students feel more comfortable sharing their faith and talking to others about Jesus. Our 5^{th} and 6^{th} graders were asked to use the following sheets to tell one other person the story they learned in Sunday School that week. That person was then asked to sign at the bottom of each sheet as proof and to help the students be accountable.


The first week they started with someone they felt very safe and comfortable with, such as their parent or grandparent. The next week or two they moved on to siblings, good friends, pastor, etc. For several weeks we joined the Adult Bible Class just as they finished their lesson, so that each student could choose someone with whom they were familiar, to share their story. Each week they were encouraged to move a little farther out of their comfort zone, until they eventually talked to someone whose faith they were unsure of, or who they knew was not a Christian. The only rule was that they couldn't talk to the same person twice.

The children seemed to really enjoy this activity and were especially eager to talk to the Adult Bible Class. This actually encouraged our adults as well. In the 3 months we did this, the students shared Bible stories with 100 people!

- The Lord and two angels visited Abraham. They reminded Abraham of God's promises and then told him Sodom and Gomorrah would be destroyed because of the great sin there.
- Abraham then asked God 5 times, boldly but humbly, to spare the city for the sake of the righteous people there. The Lord was merciful and promised to spare the city even if only 10 righteous people were found there.
- When the angels arrived at Sodom, Lot met them and to took them to his home. To protect Lot, his family and guests, God struck the evil people around his house with blindness.
- The angels warned Lot to flee and finally took him, his wife and two daughters by the hand and led them out of the city. God was merciful to them because of the prayers of Abraham, and spared their lives. But Lot's wife looked back after being told not to, and turned to a pillar of salt.
- God then rained down burning sulfur on the cities and the people and all the vegetation were destroyed. When Abraham awoke and looked toward Sodom, all he could see was dense smoke. Then he knew that not even 10 righteous people had been found in the city.

May I share a story with you that I heard in Sunday School? It's about Jacob coming home after living in a different land for 20 years.

Jacob left his uncle's home with his wives, children and flocks, and headed back to his father's home in Canaan. He prepared to meet Esau, his brother, afraid that Esau still wanted to kill him.

On this journey though, Jacob shows that his is a changed man from when he left. Instead of trusting in himself, Jacob prayed to God, with humbleness and persistence, asking God for his help and holding him to the promises he had made to him and his fathers. He showed that he now relied on God to take care of him and his family.

While on the way, God appeared to Jacob as a man, wrestling with him through the night. Jacob was very persistent and would not let him go until he blessed him. God then blessed Jacob and gave him a new name, Israel, which means "He struggles with God."

Jacob witnessed to Esau that God had been gracious to him. He built two altars, thanking God for his promises, for taking care of him, and for his many blessings. God again appeared to Jacob, blessing him and reassuring him that his promises are trustworthy.

God wants us to pray to him with humbleness and persistence. We can hold God to his promises, especially that we will live eternally in heaven one day, because Jesus paid the price for our sins.

CHRISTMAS STORY CAKE

Did you know that the Christmas Story didn't start with the angels appearing to the shepherds and Jesus being born in Bethlehem? The Christmas story really began a very long time ago in the Garden of Eden when Adam and Eve sinned for the first time and God, in his amazing love for all mankind, promised to send a Savior who would crush the power of sin.

Genesis 3:15 "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head, and you will strike his heel."

So to remind us of how sin entered the world and why we need a Savior, we start with FRUIT. (Measure 4 cups sliced apples into a bowl.)

The prophets in the Old Testament foretold the coming of the Messiah. Many times in the book of Isaiah, God is referred to as the "Holy One of Israel".

Isaiah 43:3 "For I am the Lord, your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior." To remind us that Jesus would be perfect and holy in our place, we add WHITE SUGAR. (Add $\frac{1}{2}$ c. sugar to the apples.)

Jesus was born in the small town of Bethlehem.

Micah 5:2 "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times."

Next we'll add a small amount of CINNAMON to remind us that God can even use small things in his great plan of salvation. (Add 1 t. cinnamon to the apple mix and stir until coated. Set aside.)

We've heard how on Christmas Eve the angels came to the shepherds outside of Bethlehem and announced wonderful news.

Luke 2:11 "Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord." We're using an ANGEL FOOD CAKE mix to remind us of the angels' good news. (Pour cake mix into a separate bowl and add remaining ingredients to it as you go along.)

In the Old Testament, oil was used to anoint the head of someone who would be king. 1 Samuel 16:126-13 "Then the Lord said, "Rise and anoint him; he is the one. So Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him in the presence of his brothers, And from that day on the Spirit of the Lord came upon David in power."

We use OIL to remind us that Jesus came to be our king. (Add $\frac{3}{4}$ c. oil to cake mix.)

Jesus came into the world to shed his blood for us on the cross and rise again on the 3rd day. Because of Jesus' work of redemption, we are children of God. For most of us this first occurred when we were baptized. Through baptism we receive forgiveness of sins, life and salvation.

1Peter 3:206-21 "(Noah and his family) were saved through water, and this water symbolizes baptism that now saves you also...It saves you by the resurrection of Jesus Christ."

We'll add WATER to remind us of our baptism and how Jesus blood washed us clean from sin. (Add $\frac{3}{4}$ c. water to cake mixture.)

Next we'll add a PINCH OF SALT to represent the tears of the mothers in Bethlehem whose babies were killed by King Herod.

Jeremiah 31:15 and Matthew 2:18 "A voice is heard in Ramah, weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because they are no more."

The gift of eternal life was given to all mankind through Jesus.

Romans 6:23 "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Iesus our Lord."

Next we'll add EGGS to represent the new life we have been given because Jesus came to earth. (Add 4 eggs to mixture.)

When the wise men came to see the baby Jesus, they brought gifts.

Matthew 2:11 "They saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh."

We'll add VANILLA to represent the sweet smelling incense and fragrant myrrh.

(Add 1 t. vanilla, mix well. Pour into a greased jelly roll pan, spread evenly. Top with apple mixture. Bake in 350F oven for 25-30 minutes. Remove from oven and cool 10 min.)

Lastly, we'll frost our cake with STRIPES OF ICING to remind us of the strips of cloth that the baby Jesus would be wrapped in.

Luke 2: 76 "She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, Because there was no room for them in the inn."

Our Christmas Story Cake is made with ordinary ingredients. Basic things like oil, vanilla and water, which, by themselves, aren't anything very special. But when put together in the right way with a special plan, they become something good. In the same way, God used ordinary people like the shepherds and still uses common ordinary people like us, to spread the good new about Jesus. Through His plan of salvation, the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit works in us, changing us to become something extraordinary, His dearly loved children, saved through faith in our most precious Christmas Gift.

Galatians 3:26 "You are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ."

Philippians 3:20 "But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ, who, by the power that enables him to bring everything under his control, will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like his glorious body."

1John 3:1 "How great is the love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are!"
