I coined the above phrase when I was teaching all eight grades in a one-room school. While I hate to say it, reciting that rather unspiritual and self-pity-laden mantra did help me to make it to the end of the school year sometimes. If I am going to be totally honest, I have to admit that some years I

mumbled the mantra quite early – I think No-

vember was the record. "Soon, soon it will be June" may also be the phrase or thought that has helped to get you to the end of this Sunday school year. If you have been/are still mumbling that mantra – I understand, totally.

Teaching children today, even for one hour a week, can be a very draining thing,

especially if you have been doing what you are supposed to be doing: thoroughly preparing well in advance; teaching a truly engaging lesson that connects with all the learning modalities; modeling an up-beat, positive, and spiritual attitude; praying for your students and their

families; and personally sharing yourself and your faith with students and parents alike. If you have

been doing that, then your teaching tank is probably close to the empty mark about now. Add to that the spiritual/psychological/emotional labor invested as you contemplate the impact you are having on children who sometimes seem to have so much working against them, and you wonder how you made it this far at all.

I take turns teaching 23 seventh graders in my congregation's Sunday school. Our average attendance is 19. Our class is 50/50 Lutheran elementary school and public school students. Gearing up for this class and then really delivering on the weeks I teach is one of those exhilarating/exhausting things. Usually after class, I need to go home and change out of my sweaty clothes. But while pooped, and particularly so at this time of the year, I have to say it is an incredible and exciting privilege. I know you feel the same way, otherwise you would not be involved as you are.

It is an incredible and exciting privilege to learn more about Jesus through my personal devotion and lesson preparation. It is an incredible and exciting privilege to share Jesus with students and parents who so need his grace, mercy, and peace in their lives. At this time of the year, I want to say thank you. Thank you for being one of the 5,311 Sunday school teachers in WELS who are sharing the gospel with 34,654 children. Thank you for giving of your time, talent, and frequently your treasure to provide for your students.

We may not always see the results, but we trust God's promises that his Word works. We also have the ultimate promise that gets us through to our ultimate end: Soon, soon it will be eternity...with Jesus!

### Have You Seen It Yet?



# Survey Says...

## Recent research on WELS congregations revealed the following data:

- ✓ Nine in ten WELS congregations conduct VBS.
- ✓ 91% conduct VBS on consecutive days during the week usually over five days.
- ✓ 73% of congregations surveyed said VBS is a key component in their outreach efforts.
- ✓ Biblical accuracy was listed as the most important factor in choosing a VBS.
- ✓ User friendliness was also a key factor.
- ✓ VBS survey-takers want lots of crafts, skits, music, and activities from which to choose.
- ✓ While cost and reproducibility were concerns, high quality was listed as more important.
- Congregations rate the NPH VBS materials high in biblical accuracy, quality, user-friendliness, and use of interesting themes.
- ✓ 85% of WELS congregations felt NPH should continue to publish a VBS curriculum.
- ✓ Congregations asked that the "return policy" for unused materials be reviewed.

### Great Ideas From Great Teachers

One of the objectives of *Partners* is to communicate with fellow Sunday school teachers, superintendents, pastors and teachers. ### Problems with Memory Work? —

Alice Lembach (First Lutheran, Elkhorn, WI) had students who had problems memorizing their memory verses. They would forget or just not know them. So she came up with the idea of "Football Memory Work." She writes, "We go over the memory verse a few times. The verse is written on the board. As the children read the verse I erase different parts of the verse – one word at a time. I have a small soft football. The person to whom I toss the football has to say the verse – gradually all the words are erased – by then they know it from memory. The kids love it!"

#### Bible Baseball -

A fun way to review the lesson questions! You will need to divide the class into two teams. Be sure to divide the teams according to ability so that both teams have a chance to succeed. Before the game begins, make a poster board cube (with triple, double, home run on one side each and single on the other three sides) or assign them a number on a pair of dice. Make a list of at least 20 review questions from the lesson(s). Each team should choose a name. Put the bases in various places in your room with a home plate. The batter stands on home plate while the teacher reads the question. If the question is answered correctly the batter rolls the cube to see how far they will proceed around the bases. The student goes there and waits for the next person. If the student answers incorrectly, the batter has "struck

out". The next player comes to "bat" and is given the same question. If answered correctly the game proceeds. If not, another out is given. A limit of five runs can be scored in one inning by a team. After three outs or five runs by a team, the opposing team comes to bat. (submitted by Lori Plenge, Mt. Olive, Monroe, WI)
