It's Time to Talk to Parents

Mark DeVries, in *Family Based Youth Ministry* (1994) said it so well: "Because of the extensive exposure parents have to their own children, they leave an indelible impression that radically affects how receptive their children will be to the gospel. There is overwhelming evidence that parents are, almost always, the single most significant determining factor in the development of their children."

DeVries is so correct, and most people ministering to children agree with his assessment. But why then do so many of these same ministers have such a hard time interacting with the parents of the children they teach. It's difficult to understand why ministers don't partner better with parents. Communicating with the home is **SO** important. It does so much in the way of letting the family know we care about them. It helps them to better understand how much Jesus cares for them, too. And frankly, it's not that hard, hazardous, or hair-raising.

Below are some simple suggestions for when and how to communicate with the parents of children in your Sunday School or related ministry. Any kind of communication can be very powerful. A note, email, or card are very good. A phone call is absolutely wonderful. A home visit would be out of this world! Bottom line, communication builds relationships, and Christian relationships are a great bridge to Jesus. For the sake of this article, the communication ideas below model phone contact, although face-to-face contact could also apply.

Good Times to Communicate

• When a child is doing really well in some way. Parents expect the worst when the teacher calls. Surprise them and really stroke their child.

Sample Phone Call: Of course, the conversation will vary as parents respond. (To the parent): "Hello, this is Joan Johnson from St. Paul's Sunday school. Susan has just been the most helpful the past few Sundays. She helps clean up without being asked, she shares with others so well. You can be so proud of her. Susan is such a precious little girl to the Lord and to all of us at Sunday school. We love having her in our class. I just wanted to share this with you. Keep up the good work!"

You could make a similar call when you know of some special "event" happening in the child's/family's life, i.e. new baby, death of a relative, big game coming up, birthday, etc.

• When a child is absent.

Because of all the shared custody issues with children today, perhaps a good "rule" is to have personal contact after two-three missed Sundays (or whatever day you have sessions) in a row. You can certainly do it sooner if you like, but after three, a contact with the family would be really great. A personal as opposed to written contact would be best.

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Sample Phone Call: Of course, the conversation will vary as parents respond. (To the parent): "Hello, this is Tom Weldon from Good Shepherd's Bible Hour. Justin, has missed three weeks of class, and I am just calling to see if everything is all right. (Lovingly discuss whatever may come up. Offer whatever assistance you can.) Justin is such a precious child to the Lord and to all of us at Bible Hour. We love having him in our class. We hope to see him next week."

• When a child is being a little stinker.

Let's face it, Jesus' little lambs have Old Adams just like the grown sheep do. Most times, children "act up" because their teachers have not really engaged them in the lesson. Sometimes, however, a child just wants to stir things up. Use these "tense" times as another opportunity to minister to the home in a loving way. A face-to-face interaction would be best, but if that isn't possible, try calling. Make sure your tone of voice reflects love and concern, not anger and upset.

Sample Phone Call: Of course, the conversation will vary as parents respond. (To the parent): "Hello, this is Wendy Lipinski from Our Savior's Kids' Power Hour. I have been having some difficulty with Susan, and I was wondering if you could help me with it. Susan has been talking a lot in class and disrupting things a bit. What would you suggest I do to help her see this is not appropriate? (Let parent make suggestions. That way you are coopting them into the issue and recognizing they know more about their child than you do.) Let me think about some of the things you suggested. Could you also talk to her about it? I am very glad that Susan is in my class. God has given her so many gifts and abilities (maybe cite some), but I am not going to allow her to disrupt the others. I am confident that all of us working together can resolve this little situation. Thanks so much for your time. I'll keep you posted, and God be with you.

Whatever the situation, positively communicating with parents (or guardians) holds great potential to connect God's people to each other, to the church, to the Word, and to Jesus.

Easter Oval Pictures

Need something to decorate your dining area/fellowship hall for your congregation's Easter breakfast? Try this idea submitted by Vickie Walther (Christ the Lord, Brookfield, WI).

Easter pictures (a cross, butterfly, empty tomb, stained glass window) inside an oval were copied from a children's Easter book, coloring book, online. These pictures were then enlarged to the desired mural size (4' high x 3' wide) by making a transparency of the picture, projecting the image onto a wall covered with white paper, and tracing the enlarged image on the paper. The tracing was then outlined with black marker. Each group was given one to complete.

On the Sundays in the month prior to Easter, each classroom worked on coloring in their Easter oval picture – either using markers, paint, or gluing on colored squares of construction paper. About ten minutes of class time was spent for working on this project.

This is a good way for students in Sunday school to help in preparing for Easter and decorating the church for the Easter celebration. In addition, it makes the Sunday school visible to members of the congregation.




