

Help Your Congregation Meet Its Sunday School Staff

Many times, members of a congregation do not know who their Sunday school ministry's teachers are. So why not put together and share a short paragraph about the teachers at each level? Run the paragraphs in your church's worship folder/bulletin for as many weeks as needed.

Here is a sample from Salem Lutheran Church in Milwaukee, Wisconsin...

Martha Deibert and Jenny Raasch work with our Toddler class, serving children 18 months to three years of age. Martha, who also serves as Salem's kindergarten teacher, graduated from Martin Luther College in 1995, and taught at St. John's, Newark, Delaware, before accepting the call to teach at Salem. The wife of Dave and the mother of Amy, Martha's favorite aspect of teaching is sharing Bible stories with God's little lambs.

Jenny, wife of Joel and stayhome mom of Joseph and Anna, is a former teacher who occasionally subs at Salem or other area WELS elementary schools. During her free time Jenny enjoys baking, reading, and spending time with her family.



- What's your initial reaction as to the realism of this conversation?
- Could this conversation apply in WELS circles?
- What might this conversation say about a "hidden curriculum"?
- What might you predict about this child's future in the Christian church?

The Realism of the Conversation

Did you feel that this conversation represents a pretty real situation? If you did, you'd be like hundreds of other WELS Sunday school teachers to whom I have presented it. What is shown in this interview is, sad to say, very real. It happens all the time.

Application in WELS Circles

Here again, hundreds of other WELS Sunday school teachers have expressed that this conversation could have been recorded in a WELS setting. Too often, our Sunday school classes look just like another day of school. Too frequently, our lessons are presented in less than engaging (spelled b-o-r-i-n-g) ways. And when it comes to Bible memory work, children focus on repeating the words without understanding their real meaning.

The Hidden Curriculum

The curriculum is the well-thought out, organized, systematic course of study being presented to the students—what will be taught and what students are to get out of it. For example, in many WELS Sunday schools, *Christ-Light*® is the curriculum used. Sometimes, however, students "take away" something quite different than what the curriculum and its teachers intend. They learn something far removed from what is really desired. This is called the "hidden curriculum." In too many cases, what children "learn" in Sunday school is that studying God's Word is purely an academic exercise, that knowing the facts about Jesus trumps the relationship we have with him, that Bible study is no fun, that Sunday school is not an accepting, loving, restful, peaceful, healing oasis in the week.

The Child's Future in the Church

Pondering this question is the saddest of all because the answer could very well be that this child will not have a future in the church. As soon as he is given the opportunity to decide on his own what he will do, or after he has worn his parents down enough, he will stop coming and may never return.

How would the student/researcher interview go at your Sunday school? As the 2007-08 Sunday school year winds its way to a close, and you begin thinking about next year, it might be a very good discussion question for your staff to consider. Identifying strengths and weaknesses in your Sunday school ministry now can set the stage for wonderful improvement for the year ahead. Nothing is perfect, and your Sunday school ministry never will be either. But it can always improve. Pray about it, talk about it, and work at it. Then interview a student and hear, "My Sunday school and my Jesus are awesome!"

My Sunday School Collection

While preparing for our new Sunday school year, I came across an item on the Internet that reminded me of Disney World. If you've ever been to Disney World, or know someone who has, you know about the pins to collect. It's an opportunity for you to go see all the theme parks and collect a special pin at a particular stop during your visit. It's really quite a gimmick and once you start with one pin, you want to collect them all.

I found twelve pins through Concordia Publishing House (www.cph.org) that just seemed to scream "Collect me!" It seemed like a great idea, but how could we apply it to our Sunday school?

Certainly, starting a pin collection series for our Sunday school might increase attendance. After all, the idea seems to work for Disney. However, the whole thing really needed to be meaningful and in focus with our mission. Clearly, it was something to brainstorm with our Sunday school staff.

Fortunately, we were meeting soon to gear up for Fall. I had picked up a "Colors of Faith" lanyard – a nametag holder of sorts the width of a shoelace, done in a striping of various colors each representing something special (www.orientaltrading.com) - along with clear plastic name badges and name tags. I attached each of the pins from Concordia onto the lanyard as an example for our staff. I said, "Check this out! This is so neat and there must be a way we can use it in Sunday school! What do you think?"

Our staff agreed. The potential was phenomenal for this simple lanyard of pins. Our challenge was figuring out the best way to use it. After all, Sunday school wasn't just about showing up to get pins. With the Lord's guidance, we put together a great program for our students: it is simple, lasts the entire year, and gets the kids introduced and involved in our church outside of the Sunday school hour. We designed the program for our students to meet leaders in our church, learn more about our congregation and hear about opportunities to serve God at our church. Here's how we mapped out the twelve pin collection:

When these church leaders learned the details of the pin program, they eagerly agreed to be a part of it. They each agreed on a visit date, to lead our devotion, to share their job in the congregation, to tie the specific pin assigned to them into their devotion or duties and to provide a question/answer combination for our students to collect the pins from them.

At least one day after our leaders visit Sunday school, our students can seek them out to collect the pin. Our students are easily recognizable because they wear their lanyards. The only catch to collecting the pin is answering the question. Once the question is answered, the pin is collected from that church leader. The question/answer combination is introduced during the devotion when our guests visit, it is reviewed on future Sundays and it is posted on our Sunday school bulletin board. The question/answer combinations are fairly simple. For example, for the Baptism pin, our students see Pastor Oelhafen and he asks "What does Baptism do for you?" The answer is "Washes away my sin and gives me saving faith." Our student then collects the pin from Pastor Oelhafen and adds it to their lanyard.

This simple activity of collecting pins encourages attendance at our church beyond the Sunday school classroom. It has given our students an opportunity to see, learn and participate in our congregation. In fact, it's been fun to see entire families involved in meeting these leaders and participating in the question/answer combinations to collect the pins. Next time, I'll let you know how we have been involving families throughout the entire Sunday school year. God's blessings to you as you carry out his special work in your Sunday school!



"Partners" Going Electronic

At its October 2007 meeting, the WELS Commission on Youth Discipleship voted to discontinue print production and surface mailing of *Partners*. The increasing costs of conducting all CYD ministry and the reality of decreasing Synod budgetary dollars for CYD required some cutting back. As a result, CYD will no longer mail printed copies of Partners to its subscribers. This change will take effect after the Summer 2008 print edition of the newsletter is mailed out.

Production and mailing of CYD's three newsletters (*Sowers & Seeds*, *Partners*, and *REACH!*) to over 50,000 subscribers annually, costs CYD over \$32,000. Because no subscription fees are charged, the money was taken directly from CYD's yearly operating budget. As CYD's allocation from the synod budget has decreased over the years while costs continue to rise, adjustments to CYD ministry must be made. One such adjustment is taking the newsletters online

The Commission felt better stewardship would be practiced if all CYD newsletters were delivered solely online via a Youth Discipleship Web site archive or via e-mail. This would make the production and distribution dollars currently used for the newsletters available for other CYD ministry. The change would also keep pace with how peo-

ple today are getting more and more of their information on demand via the World Wide Web.

From now on, you can get *Partners* in one of two ways:

- On the CYD Web site. Go to www.wels.net/youthdiscipleship and click on "Newsletter Archive" on the right-hand side. Browse through the appropriate folders to see the most recent issue. Read it online or print it out for yourself and others.
- 2) Go to www.wels.net/youthdiscipleship and click on "Newsletter E-mail Service" on the right-hand side. Follow the instructions for subscribing to receive e-mail notification each time a new issue is released.

New issues will be available online according to the following schedule: Fall – late August

Winter – late November Spring – late February Summer – late May

Set Aside Time for True Rest

It's so hard to slow down and pause for spiritual rest and refreshment in today's fast-paced, gotta-have-it-now world, but it's absolutely imperative, especially for the teacher of God's Word. It will require special effort to do—and more so during times of the year when we are so busy. Jesus is our model in this regard. Consider what he did...

- "After he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone..."
 (Matt. 14:23)
- "After leaving them, he went up on a mountainside to pray. When evening came, the boat was in the middle of the lake, and he was alone on land" (Mark 6:46-47).
- Jesus withdrew again to a mountain by himself... (John 6:15).

If Jesus' example isn't enough, consider these:

- God called Jacob to become Israel when he left everyone in his camp for some time alone (Gen. 32).
- Moses encountered God when he was alone, in the burning bush (Ex. 3) and on Mt. Sinai (Ex. 19).
- God called to Samuel only when he left Eli and was alone (1 Sam. 3).
- Elijah couldn't hear God's soft whisper until he was separated from other turmoil (1 Kings 19).
- John received his great Revelation when he was alone on Patmos. (Rev. 1)

Is it time for you to set aside a period of solitude and spiritual rest so you can better hear God's voice?
