Creating Youth-FULL Churches Part 2

In the last issue of *REACH*! I shared two of the four foundational statements with explanations from the "Conceptual Framework on Youth-full Churches." This framework was developed by WELS Youth Discipleship as an outgrowth of the national study, *Why Young People Leave WELS* (WYPLW). The first two foundational statements were...

Youth-full churches see the vital role they play in the training of youth...Through the example of and partnership with parents, through Christian education opportunities, and through Christ-centered activities.

Youth-full churches keep young people engaged in worship...By recognizing their needs and interests, educating them in matters of worship, seeking to include them in worship opportunities, and by doing worship well.

What follows are the final two foundational statements.

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Youth-FULL churches demonstrate Christ-like attitudes

- Concerning WELS and non-WELS Christians (WYPLW Rec. #7)
- **Concerning service opportunities for men and women** (*WYPLW Rec.* #7)
- Concerning matters of adiaphora

Paul clearly warns in 2 Timothy 4:3-4, "The time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine...They will turn their ears away from the truth..." You need not look too far to realize that we are living in these times. Because of it, we must be on guard to make sure we are not, "carried away by all kinds of strange teachings" Hebrews 13:9. While we are commanded to stand firm on the absolute truth of God's Word as recorded on the verbally inspired pages of the Bible, we are also encouraged to, "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect" 1Peter 3:15.

God wants us to defend his truth and share it with others in loving ways. As they endeavor to present sound doctrine and clear teaching, youth-full churches model and teach this "truth in

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2009 Rally Theme, Location, and Date Set

"Follow the Path, Lead the Way" has been selected as the 2009 WELS International Youth Rally theme. The theme is based on 1 Timothy 4:12, "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity." The location will be Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa (www.iastate.edu) and the dates are Wednesday-Saturday, July 8-11.

The theme, Bible passage, and location were largely the idea of the three teens who are members of the International Youth Rally Planning Committee: Tatum Gormley-Nettles (Henderson, NV), Nicole Livigne (Jupiter, FL), and CJ Fischer (Sartell, MN). All three wanted to focus rally participants and the wider WELS on the fact that teens today are important members of the Body of Christ with much to offer the church. Teens must faithfully follow the path of Jesus and then boldly lead the way for others via their example, witness, and service. Tatum, Nicole, and CJ also felt that having a rally on a college campus would be a good experience for those who would be wondering what life in college might be like. love" philosophy so that faith and love grow. Their education on and explanation of more sensitive issues is done in such a way that God is glorified and the body of Christ is built up. By the power of the Holy Spirit, youth-full churches prepare and equip their members, from the earliest ages on, to speak and act like Jesus.

Youth-FULL churches target youth/young adults for involvement in the church

- **By providing a variety of service opportunities** (*WYPLW Rec. #8, 9*)
- By staying in touch with and encouraging those away at college, military, etc. (WYPLW Rec. #10)
- **By helping youth to transition into active young adults** *(WYPLW Rec. #11)*

The Bible has a lot to say on the subject of service. Jesus washing the disciples' feet (John 13:1-17) is one great example. In that lesson, Jesus said, "Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you." In Matthew 20:26, Jesus taught his disciples: "Whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant...the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve..." Ephesians 4:12 expresses that God's people are to be prepared for "works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up." Romans 12:11 reminds the Christian to never lack zeal, but to "keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord." Ephesians 6:7 adds, "Serve wholeheartedly, as if you were serving the Lord, not men." Serving the Lord and others is an act of worship flowing from a thankful heart.

Youth-full churches recognize how important the service mindset is. They know that through the Means of Grace and the working of the Holy Spirit, children and teens are motivated to worship God and

love others through acts of service. Youth-full churches create opportunities for children and teens to serve inside and outside of the congregation, using their God-given gifts in meaningful ways. Youth-full churches know that the children and teens in their midst are valuable parts of the Body of Christ and will feel more positively about their future in the church if they can become an active part of it today.

Have the Courage to Shake Things Up

You've heard all the cliché's... "Shake things up a little", "Try new things," "Don't settle for the status quo".... After being a youth group leader for about five years, I'm learning I have to constantly try new things and be bold. However, I've also learned that the activities I chose can reflect my personal tastes and my youth group's personal tastes.

God says 11 times in the Bible, "Be strong and courageous." I have to tell myself that frequently when planning events and working with teenagers. Obviously there will be times of disappointment . . . but I want to persevere and God commands us to do just that. Here are just a few things I've tried:

1. Get personal in your church

Greet teens by name and ask them how they are doing. Find out what activities they enjoy and ask specifically about them. Try to talk to them without your "agenda of youth group events" always front and center. The teens may be less likely to run when they see you coming.

2. Get personal outside of church

While sipping a shake, an iced mocha (my favorite), or soda. In an effort to get to know some of my teens better I meet with them at local restaurants. It is less intimidating than church and fun for everyone. I do this in very small groups to keep it personal. This can be a daunting task, but focus on the teens in spiritual need (for me it is public school teens vs. those attending Lutheran high schools, for example).

3. Same old event-new twist.

For example, for about four years our teens have been helping families with special needs children get ready for Christmas. This year, we added visiting elderly people and those recuperating from major surgery, babysitting for new members with young children, and even shoveling. We were able to match the talents of teens to people's needs and even got the guys excited and participating!

4. Seek teen and parent involvement

We do a progressive dinner night in the homes of teens . . . complete with one course of a meal, a game and a devotion. We usually go to three different houses on one night. This is a great way to mix teens up and not overwhelm the hosts.

5. Get cooking

Organize a Gourmet Girls Night. I enjoy cooking and entertaining and have found this a great activity for mixing girls of different grades and schools. We do a devotion and play a game too. Guys have Game Night - go to a game or go bowling. Your hobbies can creatively turn into a teen event!

6. Communicate with multimedia

I do weekly e-mails to parents and teens, send occasional postcards or letters, hand out flyers personally, and make phone calls. Delegate as much of this as you can to the teens themselves or parents.

7. Bring in guest speakers

Occasional visits by the Pastor are an added bonus!!!

8. Listen to the teens

Incorporate their wishes in your plans.

9. Try new things

Even if you need to cancel it . . . don't give up. Count the teens that are there, not the teens that aren't!

10. PRAY

Ask for God's guidance in every "shake" you make!

"REACH!" Going Electronic

At its October 2007 meeting, the WELS Commission on Youth Discipleship voted to discontinue print production and surface mailing of *REACH*!. The increasing costs of conducting all CYD ministry and the reality of decreasing Synod budgetary dollars for CYD required some cutting back. As a result, CYD will no longer mail printed copies of *REACH*! to its subscribers. This change will take effect after the Summer 2008 print edition of the newsletter is mailed out.

Production and mailing of CYD's three newsletters (*Sowers & Seeds, Partners*, and *REACH*!) to over 50,000 subscribers annually costs CYD over \$32,000. Because no subscription fees are charged, the money was taken directly out of CYD's yearly operating budget. As CYD's allocation from the synod budget has decreased, adjustments to CYD ministry must be made. One such adjustment is taking the newsletters online.

The Commission feels this approach is better stewardship and makes dollars currently used for the newsletters available to fund other needed ministries. It also keeps pace with how people today are getting more and more of their information on demand via the World Wide Web.

From now on, you can get *REACH!* in one of two ways:

- 1) On the CYD Web site. Go to www.wels.net/youthdiscipleship and click on "Newsletter Archive" on the right-hand side. Browse through the appropriate folders to see the most recent issue. Read it online or print it out for yourself and others.
- 2) Go to www.wels.net/youthdiscipleship and click on "Newsletter E-mail Service" on the right-hand side. Follow the instructions for subscribing to receive e-mail notification each time a new issue is released.

New issues will be available online according to the following schedule: Fall – late August Spring – late February Winter – late November Summer – late May

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
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REACH!
